Nine Tips for Pet Owners Carpet Care

ets are a wonderful addition to the family but they also introduce new cleaning challenges. From accidents to furcovered carpets, you can keep your home clean if you know the tips that make the difference for pet owners. These tips will ensure you and your pet enjoy many happy years together – on clean carpets.

1. Paper Towels Are Your Friend (So Treat Them Gently)

Use them to soak up everything from vomit to urine. Blot with them but don't step on them or grind them into the carpet. The harder you press, the more you'll push the liquids into the carpet and even to the subflooring. The best course is to hire a professional.

2. Store-Bought Bio-Enzymatic Cleaners Are Not Enough

It's tempting to use a store-bought bio-enzymatic cleaner, but do not be fooled into thinking that a spray bottle of enzymes will be enough to combat urine. You need to contact a professional such as S&G Carpet Cleaning to clean the carpets. Your technician will use the proper enzymes in the appropriate amount and has the equipment to extract it efficiently.

3. Never Steam Clean - Instead Use Hot Water Extraction This is a big no-no because the heat will bond the odor and the



stain to the carpet fibers, giving you a permanent change you don't want. It's important to note that hot water extraction is NOT the same as steam cleaning and is the preferred method of cleaning carpet.

4. Use A Putty Knife

If you have a putty knife it can be used to pull solids out of your carpet. It works best with a small putty knife using the edge-side (not the flat side). Slide a putty knife edge under the solid and into the carpet to scrape and lift it out of the fibers.

5. Just Say No to Home Remedies

It's tempting to reach for quick fixes you heard worked for someone once but resist the temptation. While solutions like baking soda and vinegar seem to work temporarily, they only mask odors and leave you with the original problem. You need a trained professional to come and clean out any urine or feces. Any home remedy is a temporary solution to be used until a professional can arrive with the proper equipment. 6. Get Creative to Clean Pet Fur

You can buy a lint roller...or wrap duct or masking tape around a paint roller to make your own—connect a broom handle to create a floor cleaner and use it before you vacuum to avoid clogging your vacuum cleaner. Rubber-bristled carpet rakes are also helpful for cleaning pet hair. Remember to vacuum several times a week.

7. Plan Ahead For Carpeting

If you're thinking ahead, invest in pet-friendly carpeting made from nylon fibers. They're durable and stain resistant-and affordable – making it easier to avoid messes and to clean them if they happen. Continued on page 12

Early detection and prevention of health issues

Regular grooming helps to inspect the skin abnormalities like a bump, lesion, and inflammation. The professional groomer can detect these diseases that a pet owner might miss. This early detection helps to cure the problem without any complexity quickly.

Regular bathing and brushing prevent the development of skin problems. It also aids in the removal of dead skin from the body. Proper brushing improves the blood circulation on the coat, so it remains healthy. Clean and trimmed air improves the airflow inside the coat that is very useful in summer to control the aggressive behavior of pooches. Keep away fleas and ticks.

Ticks act as vectors in the spread of several microbial diseases. Coats or furs of animals (both pet and wild animals) are the home of fleas and ticks. They get their nutrients from the host body and, as a result, make them sick.

You can keep these fleas and tick away from the body of your dog through regular grooming. The groomer can also identify the flea's egg and remove it. Few products are also available in the market aids in getting rid of these blood-sucking parasites. Prevention of dental disease

Regular teeth brushing prevent the formation of dental plaque, and their mouth does not smell bad. Brushing inhibits the growth of bacteria on the teeth, and thus the teeth remain healthy for long.

Removal of ear hair is also necessary for healthy hearing. The

8. Dry Those Paws

Dry your pet's paws when you enter the house. A quick cleaning with a towel kept at your entrance will help to keep mud and other debris from getting tracked across your carpets.

9. Act Quickly

Whatever the mess, move as quickly as possible to clean the carpet. The longer it waits, the harder it could be to remove it and avoid stains. With a little time and effort, it's easy to keep your carpets in good condition while taking care of your pets.

unwanted hair growth in the ear hinders the airflow and creates a moist environment inside the ear. The moist ear is most likely to catch yeast infections which is very painful for pets. Prevent matted hair

If your dog has slightly long hair, they are more likely to develop matts. Matts are the tangling of fur around itself, and it becomes knotted, so the air does not reach the skin. As a result of loss of airflow, the skin becomes moist and may develop sores.

Due to matted formation, the dogs remain irritated and uncomfortable. The only way to avoid matt formation is proper and regular brushing and trimming.

## Peanut Butter Dog Treats Recipe With Silicone Pan


## Non-Sticking Silicone Pan Peanut Butter Dog Treats

2 eggs, beaten

2 Tablespoons oil (I used canola)

1/2 cup peanut butter powder (I used "PBfit" brand. Its ingredients are peanuts, coconut palm sugar, and salt.) DO NOT USE ANY PRODUCT WITH THE SWEETENER XYLITOL. IT IS TOXIC TO DOGS.

1/2 cup white flour 1/2 cup tapioca flour 1/2 cup water Mix well. You



want it smooth. Put about half the batter in the middle of the pan and spread it outwards. It takes less batter than you think. I don't bother to fill every single hole in the pan anymore, i.e., not the outer rows, because of the time it takes. My apologies to the compulsive types! I do like the look of a *neatly filled pan*, but the time isn't worth it to me. But feel free! Bake at 350 degrees F for 12 minutes, or until the individual treats are still soft but starting to draw away from the sides of the pan. Let cool a little and stretch the pan in both directions to loosen the treats. I show the stretching in the video. Dump them out. Peanut butter dog treats!

And like the treats made with the chicken recipe I posted previously, these work perfectly in the Manners Minder/Treat and Train using the insert with the
