In Defense of Feral Cats . . .

I understand the objections to community cats but most of the problems occur because a colony has not been controlled. For more than 10,000 years, cats have lived among humans sharing the environment with birds and wildlife. One of the common misconceptions about community cats is that removing (killing) them is the only way to control colonies.

* If cats are removed from their outdoor home, it creates a territorial opening—or vacuum— that will not remain empty.

* According to one scientific journal article, "...the presence of feral cats in a place indicates an ecological niche for approximately that number of cats." (Zaunbrecher) Each time cats are removed, the population will rebound to

fill that niche.


* Removing cats from an area may cause a temporary decrease in the cat population, but more cats WILL take their place—and it won't take long.


* This phenomenon is known in conservation studies as the Vacuum Effect. The Vacuum Effect has been observed in many species, not just cats.

* Catching and removing (or killing) cats is therefore futile. It is an expensive, deadly cycle which yields no long-term benefits.

* Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR) is the only way to stabilize cat populations. It is the humane, effective approach to community cats and is sound public policy.

How to inquire of and contract with a Professional Pet Sitter

- 1) Search for Professional Pet Sitters at the National Assn. for Professional Pet Sitters (www.petsitters.org) and Pet Sitters International (www.petsit.com) websites;
- **2)** Ask for referrals from your Veterinarian, Groomer, Trainer, family and friends;
- 3) Discuss your pet care needs in detail with your prospective pet sitter, be honest about your pets' behavior, health and special needs;
- **4)** Get a written quote and agree to a price (and terms) BEFORE you leave on your trip;
- **5)** Ask for proof (and copies) of Business License, Insurance and Bond! Also find out WHO will be coming to your home to provide the pet-care service. Check references;
- **6)** Schedule the Meet and Greet with the Pet Care provider (the person who will

actually be performing the pet-care visits);
7) Make sure the pet-sitter has a PLAN B in the unlikely event they are unable to perform their duties and on the schedule, you've agreed to...know what their course of action is for Plan B and WHO will be in your home if it's not the person you hired;

- 8) Leave well written, last-minute notes in a visible location and a clean work-space;
- **9)** Ensure your pet-sitter is prepared to text or email you daily or per-visit updates with photos of how your pets are doing in your absence;
- **10)** Share your positive experience and reviews of your pet-sitting experience with your friends and family!



Through TNR, community cats are humanely trapped, altered, vaccinated, ear tipped for identification, and returned to their outdoor homes where they not only continue to lead full, healthy lives, but they provide a natural solution to rodent and pest control. According to a recent Harris Interactive poll, 84 percent of Americans prefer that their communities use tax dollars to adopt sterilization as its cat control policy instead of bringing cats found outdoors into shelters to be killed. And that is true even when they are unaware of the Vacuum Effect. People simply believe, correctly, that cats have intrinsic value to their lives and do not want them to suffer and be killed.



PUPPY'S RULE OF TWELVE from ASPCA

puppy is most willing to try new things before she reaches the age of five (5) months. The Puppy's Rule of Twelve is a handy guideline for puppy owners to ensure that a puppy is exposed to a variety of things during this critical time-period. It is very important to ensure all experiences are positive - so be ready to reward your puppy with lots of super, yummy treats and praise. If your puppy is scared or frightened of something slow down, decrease distance or intensity and reassure her.

By the time your puppy is five (5) months old, your puppy should have:

EXPERIENCED TWELVE (12) different surfaces - Wood, woodchips, grass, asphalt/cement, tile, wet grass, rocks, gravel, dirt, mud, puddles, grates, uneven surfaces, metal, on a table, on a chair, etc.

PLAYED with twelve (12) different objects - Fuzzy toys, hard toys, big & small balls, funny sounding toys, wooden items, paper/cardboard items, milk jugs, metal items, etc.

EXPERIENCED TWELVE (12) different locations - Front yard, other people's homes, lake, pond, river, boat, elevator, stairs, car, moving car, veterinarian (just to say "hi" & get lots of treats - no vaccinations), kennel, grooming salon (just to say "hi" & to get lots of treats - no grooming), etc. MET & PLAYED with twelve (12) different people (outside of the family) - Include children, adult men, adult women, elderly adults, people in wheelchairs, people on crutches, people with hats, people with sunglasses, etc.

EXPOSED to twelve (12) different noises - Garage door opening, doorbell, sirens, children playing, babies crying, loud/big trucks, motorcycles, laundry machines, skateboards, shopping carts rolling, motorboats, clapping, loud singing, vacuums, lawnmowers, pan dropping, etc.

It is very important to observe your puppy's body language during this exercise to ensure she is not frightened or uncomfortable. Reduce the distance to the object or the level of the noise until she is comfortable and reward her with lots of super, yummy treats and praise. See Canine Body Language tip sheet for more information on body language.

EXPOSED to twelve (12) fast moving objects (don't allow to chase) - Skateboards, roller skates, bicycles, cars, trucks, boats, people/children running, cats, wild critters, scooters, vacuums, horses running, etc.

EXPERIENCED twelve (12) different challenges - Climbing stairs, climbing off/in/around a box, going through a tunnel, climb over obstacles, going in & out of doorways, walking on a wobbly table, play hide-n-seek, jump over something, getting a bath, etc.

HANDLED by owner & family members twelve (12) times a week - Hold under arm, hold to chest, hold on floor near owner, hold in-between owner's legs, hold head, look in ears, hold paws, hold and take temperature (with veterinarian's assistance), hold like a baby, hold & trim toenails (with veterinarian's assistance), hold in lap, look in mouth, etc.

EATEN from twelve (12) different containers - Wobbly bowl, metal, cardboard, paper, coffee cup, pie plate, plastic, frying pan, KONG, dogsafe puzzle toy, spoon fed, etc.

EATEN in twelve (12) different locations - Back yard, front yard, crate, kitchen, basement, bedroom, laundry room, friend's house, car, school, bathtub, up high (supervised), under an object, etc.

PLAYED with as many puppies and safe adult dogs as possible.

LEFT ALONE safely, away from family and other animals twelve (12) times a week for a period of 5 to 45 minutes.

Start with a short time period and gradually increase the amount time your puppy is alone. See Crate Training tip sheet for more information.

EXPERIENCED a leash and collar twelve (12) different times in twelve (12) different locations.

en Tips for Keeping Your Children Safe When You Have Pets To experienced dog owners or parents, close interaction with children and pets may seem like no big deal – but if dogs decide to retaliate or play in a too aggressive way, they are all too often punished

for something they didn't know was wrong. In certain situations, these dogs are sent to animal shelters, marked as too aggressive, or euthanized for behaviors and actions that could be avoided if adult humans would simply show some concern and respect for the animals and children in their care.

If you have children and pets in your home, take a moment and make sure that you are taking the proper precautions to keep everyone in the home safe. We all get busy or distracted, but with a

few precautions, a little distraction won't lead to disaster.

Here are 10 tips to keep kids and pets safe:

- 1.) When the dog is around, don't put the baby on the floor. If a baby is on the floor, it can oftentimes look like a toy to your dog. A baby is too small and fragile to roll out from under a heavier dog, and it can create a dangerous situation.
- **2.)** Never leave baby and pet alone together unsupervised Similar to leaving them together on the floor, there can be unforeseen circumstances that could put the baby or the dog in danger.
- **3.)** Don't let the baby out of your sight This is a pretty basic rule for babies and parents, it is especially important with pets around as babies and pets should not be left alone unsupervised.
- 4.) Don't let children approach unaware or

5.) Never let baby hit, throw toys at, or sit on

your dog Similar to a child approaching an unaware dog, this may annoy or irritate your dog and make them feel defensive.

- 6.) Don't let them approach unknown dogs, don't let your dog approach unknown kids There are unknown dangers, such as aggressive dogs or kids who don't know the rules to not anger a dog.
- 7.) Teach babies not to take things out of a pet's mouth Putting your hand in the mouth of any animal is rarely a good idea, as they are more likely to feel threatened or uncomfortable

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This is bad parenting and bad pet ownership. This is how kids get bit and family dogs get put to sleep. Teach your children to respect animals and not treat them like a jungle gym.

and snap at them.

- **8.)** Never let them sleep or lay in the same bed. The baby could be inadvertently smothered by your pup or may be subject to the rowdiness some dogs display and could be injured.
- **9.)** Don't neglect your pup when the baby is born If they are both fighting for your attention, it could create an issue and strain on their relationship.
- 10.) Don't run

Running from an animal causes them to feel the need to chase, causing them to play too rough. While you should do research before bringing home a pup to a baby, or a baby to a pup, these tips should keep your family healthy and happy.

Put "old" toys out of sight for a month or two and then bring them out again - your dog will enjoy them just as much as when they were new.

GIVE YOUR TIME

You are the center of your dog's world. You may be tired after a long day at work, but your dog has spent the day anxiously awaiting your return. Reward that loyalty with your time. Pet him, talk to him, play with him, laugh with him. Let your dog know you value his company.

FIND THE "SPOT"

Scratch your dog's belly often. If you find the "spot," so much the better.

LÊAVE THE RADIO ON

Try leaving the radio or television on when you leave your dog alone. The noise will keep him company.

PLAN ACTIVITIES WITH YOUR DOG

When you bring a dog into your family, that dog is yours for life. If you can't keep that commitment, don't make it. And once you've made it, don't break it. Your dog's life depends on you.

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






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
