PALMDALE — If you love dogs and don't have one at home, the Los Angeles County Department of Animal Care and Control may have a solution for you: volunteer to play with them.

That's right, LA County Animal Care and Control is looking for volunteer runners for dog play groups. Each of the department's seven care centers, including Lancaster and Palmdale, holds regular dog play groups.

"It's basically a great way for

dogs to get exercise, socialize and we also learn more about their behavior," Deputy Director Allison Cardona said in a telephone interview.

Cardona said the volunteer program is the ideal opportunity for someone who likes to be outdoors and who wants to get their steps in because it requires a lot of walking.

Volunteers bring the dogs from the kennel into the center's play yard for the supervisor who maintains the

DOGGIE COOKIES

Ingredients2 cups all-purpose flour

- 1 cup cornmeal
- 1 large egg beaten
- 3 tablespoon vegetable
- 1/2 cup chicken broth
- 2 teaspoons dried parsley
- 1 cup chopped cooked chicken livers
- chicken livers

 1 teaspoon brown sugar
- 1 cup canned mixed
 - vegetables mashed DRAINED & RINSED

Instructions

Combine flour and cornmeal.

In a separate bowl, beat egg with the oil; add broth and parsley, mixing well.

Slowly stir the dry ingredients into the wet ingredients, mixing well. Add the chicken livers and mix well.

Turn out onto a floured work surface and knead for 3 to 5 minutes. Roll dough to 1/2-inch thickness and cut into desired shapes.

Bake at 400*F for 15 minutes or until nicely browned. Cool completely on wire racks.

Last month, one of our clients become ill and was hospitalized. While she was in the hospital, she had friends pop by the house to feed and care for her two dogs. I took the pups for walks, and we all assumed our client would come back home within a week or so.

Sadly, our client passed away unexpectedly and immediately left her pups without an owner.

Thankfully, she had filled out a Pet Guardianship form when she first became our client, and I was able to contact the person listed as her Pet Guardian. In addition, our client had established a relationship with a local pet Rescue several years ago and they we able to take the pups and foster them until they could find furever homes. I was relieved to have a Pet Guardian who could make that transition happen quickly for the two pups.

'So, what is YOUR plan for your pets should you become incapacitated and unable to care for your pets? Do you have your pet care itemized in your Will or Trust and are there specific people assigned to care for your pets? Do you have money set aside for their food, shelter, medication, and long-term care? While none of



ASK YOUR VET...

Q. I work with my hands and will sometimes get small cuts and scrapes. My dog (Bichon Freise /Poodle) will want to lick them. Is it O. K. for him to do so?

A. From a purely Hygiene Perspective NO!!! There are natural occurring enzymes formed in the saliva. Dogs lick naturally and instinctively to clean and groom themselves. This instinct to clean their skin and fur is instilled in their mind; and when injury occurs, it becomes a mental extension of a natural and normal way which is activated into "the only way they know to keep their wounds clean." For all wild animals, if able, they instinctively will lick or attempt to lick the open traumatized tissue. As the dirt and grime is being removed from their wound by licking and chewing, the salivary glands are releasing digestive enzymes that breakdown food stuff.

Tongues are very strong muscles that can place a lot of pressure to remove debris and dead and/or dying tissue. Instinctively, your wounded dog (or cat) has an inherited mind set; and follows the only way they can remove dirt, debris and dying tissue from their wounds is by licking and chewing.

The injured tissue is more likely contaminated by pathogenic (disease) causing microorganisms, primarily bacteria, and very likely a higher volume of invaders beyond what a clean mouth will have. Further, there is a higher risk of other types of disease-causing microbes that will be able to rapidly invade injured tissue.

In my conclusion, when I have received minor injuries like skin pricks, scrapes, scratches and scuffs on my forearms, hands or fingers, I naturally react to the pain signal with a "wanting urge" to respond instinctively (impulsively, mechanically, automatically); and actually have done so more often when I was younger and have learned to suppress in my adult years and especially in my duties and interactions as a veterinarian of wanting to lick an accessible skin injury!!!

9 MYTHS ABOUT PET LOSS

Dina Taylor, MA, LMFT

MYTH: "It's just an animal."
TRUTH: Grief is a normal reaction
when mourning the loss of a
significant object in your life. Don't
allow others to diminish the
emotional value that your pet held
for you.

MYTH: "Pets are replaceable. You should get another one."

TRUTH: Each pet has its own unique place in our hearts. Be cautious not to rush out and buy or adopt a new pet before you have had a chance to fully mourn the loss of your former pet companion.

MYTH: "The loss of a fish isn't the same as the loss of a dog or cat." TRUTH: Fish, bird, hamster, lizard, horse, rabbit, dog, or cat. Love is love, and attachment is attachment. It is not the size or shape of the package, but rather the gift inside. A single solitary goldfish won at a carnival may be

someone's sole companion for many, many years. Imagine all the things that fish has seen, and all the secrets it has heard.

MYTH: "You are grieving way too long."

TRUTH: There is no specific timeline for getting over a significant loss. In general, grief comes in stages which may include Denial, Anger, Bargain-ing, Depression, Acceptance, and Finding Meaning. (Elisabeth Kübler-Ross). Be aware that not everyone goes through all the stages or in that specific order.

MYTH: "Children should be protected from having to grieve." TRUTH: Children are a lot more resilient than we give them credit for. Telling them the truth (in a way they can understand) helps them under-stand the finality of death, allows them to learn how to mourn, and helps to prepare them for

future losses in their lives.

MYTH: "People who don't have pets just don't get it."

TRUTH: We can help others, who may not have experienced a deep bond and attachment with an animal, by sharing our experiences with them.

MYTH: "Everyone grieves the loss of a pet in the same way."
TRUTH: We all grieve differently. There are a wide range of ways people process the loss of a pet including crying, depressed mood, isolating, difficulty concentrating, appetite/sleep disturbance, blaming ourselves or others, anger, and denial/mini-mizing. All of these reactions are perfectly normal. It is important to allow each family member to grieve in their own way.

MYTH: "Animals are lucky because they don't experience grief." TRUTH: Research shows that animals do grieve the loss of their companions. Common symptoms may include lack of appetite, listlessness, disorientation, whining, increased clinginess or separation anxiety, looking for their missing friend, or watching for their return. Evidence shows that animals process grief best when they have been allowed to spend time with their partner after the death.

MYTH: "I need to appear strong and not talk about how I'm feeling so that others won't worry about me."

TRUTH: Being vulnerable allows others an opportunity to provide us with comfort, support, and healing. The only way to go through it, is to go through it. If you, or someone you care about is suffering from extended grief and loss, there is help.

These animals were chosen for a variety of their natural instincts and vast numbers were killed, often suffering agonizing deaths from wounds, starvation, thirst, exhaustion, disease and exposure.

yard. They assist with the play group and then return the dog to a kennel. If a volunteer finds a dog they like, they can promote it on social media with pictures and videos to help the dog find a forever home.

"It's really a great way to do service and then also get to learn more about dogs and dog behavior," Cardona said.

There can be up to 10 dogs playing together at one time. Depending on the time of the year, there could be a kiddie pool in the yard for the dogs to splash around in.

"It's just a lot of fun and joyful to see them," Cardona said.

The play helps the center's staff

evaluate a dog's personality. They observe a dog's play style — rough or rowdy or gentle and dainty — to find a suitable home.

Volunteers need to be at least 16 years old. They must be able to commit to weekly scheduled shifts with weekday and weekend shifts available. They must be enthusiastic to learn and will receive comprehensive virtual and hands-on training. They must be vaccinated against COVID-19.

The county is also looking for people 18 and older to volunteer in one of four care center clinics, include the Palmdale Animal Care Center. These volunteers assist veterinarians and vet techs with tasks such as handling animals or prepping them for surgery.

"It's really great for someone who either has skill already or is considering this maybe for a career path and wants to get some experience and wants to learn more about animal medicine," Cardona said.

Volunteers must commit to a minimum of nine months for two hours a week or eight hours a month. For details, fill out an application by visiting https://www.volgistics.com/ex/port al.dll/ap?AP=790177110.
